## **Sky Over The East In Conversation Series**

Barjeel Art Foundation Founder, Sultan Sooud Al Qassemi & Matthew Sansom, Head of Abu Dhabi Classic FM 28 May 2014, Emirates Palace

In an informative and upbeat discussion preceding the opening of the lastest large-scale exhibition of modern Arab art in the UAE, Sultan Sooud AI Qassemi looked back on his adventures in art collecting. In addition to gaining insight into the exhibition and the works presented, the audience also learnt about the role of a collector, the story of Barjeel Art Foundation, the story of its founder and his vision for the future.

Sultan credits his appetite for art to visits to museums in the French capital. His collecting took on a serious note in 2004 and by 2010, the Government of Sharjah had offered him a space in which to exhibit his acquisitions. Since then, Sultan's collection has grown from 300 to approximately 700 pieces.

The Sharjah Government's generosity highlights the importance of the public sector's support for art. It also mirrors Sultan's belief that each and every private collector has an obligation to share their collections with the public. With that in mind, Sultan approaches the act of collecting with the eye of a public entity as well as a private individual; "I feel like the collection should be handled in a public manner. I would be presenting an incomplete picture if I only bought to keep it private. Additionally, it's important to buy an artist's work across all periods, not only the ones that one personally appreciates."

While research is integral to informed acquisitions, the fundamental tool for a collector is instinct: "You see it. You Like it. You want it. You are the ultimate judge. It's valuable because it pleases you. You have a connection and it makes sense to you. But it is important to speak to artists, galleries, collectors and critics. They will add value to your knowledge." Sultan highlighted the qualities of the national art community - a united group of expertise that stretches across the 7 Emirates. He also commented on the important role of auction houses, which have unearthed information on many Arab artists that time almost forgot, thereby adding value to not only the art and artist, but to the movement of modern Arab art overall. He also praised the extensive Noor Library at Meem Gallery as a great learning resource for Arab visual art.

Sultan explored the dilemma of investing in artists by acquiring works and exhibiting them. "Be careful what you wish for! Once an artist has a big show, prices go up. If you promote an artist but have not finished building their presence in your collection, you might be in trouble!" Similarly, Sultan has learnt

to curb his enthusiasm when discovering work. Before reserving one particular piece by the Syrian calligrapher Mouneer Al Shaarani, Sultan tweeted his admiration, only to find that one of his online followers had acquired it: "It's a small world and word travels fast. I've learnt my lesson. I reserve first, then I tweet."

Referring to artists of Emirati origin, Sultan acknowledged the added responsibility as a UAE citizen. 'Sky Over The East' presents works by 6 citizen artists - Mohammed Al Mazrouei, Hassan Sharif, Ali Al Abdan and Mohammed Kazem. The Barjeel Founder warned against short-term, tokenistic endeavours; "It's important to maintain the quality and not buy for the sake of it. You want artists to aspire to a higher level."

While Sultan is certainly one of the UAE's most active patrons of the arts, he steers away from commissioning works; having experienced the awkwardness of disliking a work he directly requested; "It does make sense but I've had bad luck."

As prices appreciate, a market tends to experience an influx of fakes. Of the 700 works in his collection. Sultan has uncovered 7 to 8 suspect pieces. "The richer the country's history of art, the more forgeries there are," he said referring to places such as Iraq, Morocco, Egypt and Syria. Authentication is a major challenge in the Arab region as there is no official authority. As experts can disagree, Sultan prefers to seek the opinion of the artist's family. His preferred purchase point is, of course, through an auction house (with their established processes of due diligence and research, including extensive provenance investigation) despite their 20-30% premium; "... at least they follow international practices. Institutions have a team that studies the importance of a work. You know the due diligence has been done." Sultan went on to describe the adrenalin rush felt at auctions and the satisfaction one can experience even as an underbidder!

What about letting go? Sultan admits he has never sold a piece, although he is happy to trade with other collectors and has 'de-excessed' works through charity auctions; "We have a list of 30-40 artworks for this purpose so that the collection can rotate and a good cause can benefit."

And what of the future? 'Sky Over The East' presents





historical, cultural, social and economic milestones in the history of the Arab-speaking world through the work of Effat Naghi, Ahmed Cherkaoui and Abdullah Al Muharraqi, among others. Sultan predicts that the artists of the 21<sup>st</sup> century will capture the rise of technology, graffiti art, the role of women artists, and new media.

Returning to the public obligation he strongly values, Sultan is pleased to collaborate with organisations such as ADMAF in order to ensure that every part of his collection is not hidden in storage. "Artists want their art out of the storage and to be exposed. They can sell at a discount or even gift for free because they know it will be shown." he disclosed.

Barjeel Art Foundation and ADMAF's share an equally firm commitment to arts education. With 470 pieces online (increasingly daily), Barjeel also welcomes schools and young people; "It gives me a great deal of pleasure to see others enjoy the work. If the work makes you think, it opens the door to analytical thought and interaction."

With multiple forms of expression hailing from Europe, Africa, Arab world as well as its own rich culture, the UAE art scene is incomparable within the Gulf region. The artists, studios, foundations, fairs, and galleries provide an entire ecosystem. With the current momentum, art is establishing itself as a viable career path. While many lament the modest numbers of full-time artists, Sultan remains patient and optimistic, equating the pace of progress with the growth of sports professionals over the last 50 years. "The perception of art as a career has gone through the same stages all over the world."

Following the formal lecture, during the Q&A session the first question came from H.E. Sheikha Lubna Al Qassemi, UAE Minister of International Cooperation & Development who congratulated Sultan on his role as a transformer and his ability to share: "You are an authority because people trust your brand. You are a pioneer. My generation was engineering and then it changed the world. You made a choice and took a risk." In response to the question 'How can we help share your legacy?" Sultan stressed the importance of shared responsibility – to collect and curate creatively irrespective of finance or ability.

Another audience member asked whether Barjeel Art Foundation's plans to exhibit the collection in other parts of the world, Sultan spoke of recent loans to the Modern Art Museum in Antwerp as well as other cultural venues in Istanbul, Berlin, Istanbul, Stuttgart, Japan, Washington DC and Barjeel's 2013 exhibition in Singapore that attracted 58,000 visitors over 2 months, unprecedented for modern Arab art.

Questions followed regarding the state of arts journalism in the UAE, gender representation in collections, and morality versus creativity.

The final question was left to the moderator Matthew Sansom who asked the burning question, "Your house is in flames. What two works would you save?"

Stumped momentarily, Sultan replied, "It's like asking me to save 2 kids when I have 4.... Because my collection is public, I would rescue a piece I love and another with historical value."

### **Sky Over The East In Conversation Series**

Ali Al Abdan, Artist & Critic & Sameh Khawach, ADMAF 4 June 2014, Emirates Palace Gallery in association with Emirates Writers Union

Abu Dhabi Music & Arts Foundation (ADMAF) and the Barjeel Art Foundation, in association with Emirates Writers Union, hosted the second talk in the 'In Conversation' series, part of the 'Sky Over The East' exhibition at Emirates Palace Gallery. The talk, entitled 'Pen to Brush: The Journey of a Scholar-Artist' brought together featured artist, Ali Al Abdan, and Sameh Kaawach from ADMAF to discuss Ali's relationship with the visual arts, both as an artist and critic, as they examined the UAE visual arts. Al Abdan stated that he is not strictly committed to movement.

The talk began with Ali Al Abdan offering an overview of the history of visual art in the United Arab Emirates and his experience in the field of art criticism. In his book 'The New Century: Directions of the Visual Arts in the UAE since 2000', he refers to his artistic quest to fill an internal need that cannot be defined. He recalled the time when he started to develop his knowledge of the visual arts by examining the aesthetic beauty of the surrounding environment in which he lived. This affected his view and approach of art for the dry desert environment was a landscape lacking in colour.

Al Abdan's fascination with the sculptural form is longstanding – a practice that is almost instinctive to him. He believes that the process of sculpting enables the artist to innovate and explore his creativity. As a sculptor, an artist possesses the ability to express volume and perspective in a three-dimensional form that painting on canvas or paper cannot achieve.

Through his artistic practice, Al Abdan explained that he does not specifically seek to illustrate the traditions of Emirati culture nor does he seek to reflect upon the folkloric content of the country's past. In contrary to the critical opinions of others, he transmits stories from the past in a deeper way; describing his work as confident, direct and honest epitomised by symbols and thoughts that refer to other tales.

Al Abdan does not subscribe to the style of expressionism because this particular school does not offer a satisfactory space to express – it restricts

him as an artist within the limits of convention and prevents the reflection of contemporary thinking. During the discussion, he referred to those critics belonging to this school as those who overcomplicate: preferring to indulge their feelings and emotions in poetic terms that give meanings and explanations that do not concur with the theme nor explain the full value of the work.

one particular style. In the creation of a new work, he is driven only by thought and memory, following a path he knows not where it will lead. He uses modern techniques such as collage, counter to the classical school, and siding more with Cubism and Surrealism in order to break conventional forms.

Referring to the piece 'On Al Khan Beach', exhibited as part of 'Sky Over The East'), Al Abdan recalled his attempt to capture the view from a particular hotel in Sharjah in 1988 with oil on canvas. The work took a vear to complete.

Al Abdan commented that the concept of art remains unclear for many visual artists in the UAE; remarking that most work produced can only be described as a visual experience deprived of beauty.

In conclusion, Al Abdan returned to the motivation behind the book. 'The New Century: Directions of the Visual Arts in the UAE since 2000'. He wanted to explain the term 'conceptual' in a simple, easy language accessible to as wide a readership as possible.

### Sky Over The East In Conversation Series

Saeed began the talk by posing the guestion 'Do museums matter today?' Atava spoke of mankind's right to participate in culture and fulfil one's intellect. This 'common wealth', which has been handed down by ancestors, should be accessible to all and, in 2014, it is technology that offers myriad opportunities around how we explore, understand and appreciate this rich legacy. The definition of a museum today is almost limitless. While many are public institutions, the informal environments that they create nurture learning. They are, in essence, "a living organism that listens to the community in which they exist." Ataya highlighted a concern shared by many museum directors; that the worst reaction from a visitor is indifference. If one can create spaces of contemplation, exploration and thought, where exhibits have substance and multiple layers of interpretation that leave visitors with a lasting memory, then the museum is succeeding. She referred to the recent exhibition at the Sharjah Museum of Islamic Civilization - 'So that you might know each other - the world of Islam from North Africa to China and beyond' - which presented items of Islamic art from the Vatican Collection. "It gave wonderful insight into visitor psychology and social attitudes. The weekly majlis offered open discourse, further affirming the exhibition's message of peace and interfaith dialogue," Ataya said.

So in today's world, what is their role? Ataya referred to the need to be 'positively provocative', believing that a museum's critical mission is to answer the public need to understand their culture as well as others and the connections between. An effective museum is rooted in research and analysis; understanding the possibilities of one's collection and the nature and needs of one's audience today and tomorrow. Ataya hailed H.H. Dr Sheikh Sultan Al Qassemi, Ruler of Sharjah, as a forerunner who, to this day, applies his extensive knowledge and personal touch to many aspects of the museums' mechanisms.

A museum, of course, is only as effective as the captain steering it. And in a country that is witnessing

exhibits, individuals such as Ataya need to continue their professional development to benefit the institutions in which they work. Ataya's childhood interest culminated in a Museum Studies degree at Harvard yet she remains familiar with the latest trends, practices and activities by attending conferences and summits. "Running a museum is akin to a Field Marshall or CEO. Its success is down to the effectiveness and abilities of its manpower." alluding to the army of skilled staff that maintains every aspect of Sharjah's 16 museums and all in accordance with international best practice. A panorama of expertise is required that traverse business management, international relations, development, education as well as art and antiquities. Today, the UAE needs more of its citizens to pursue careers in this sector as archivists, educationalists, curators, and restorers, to name but a few.

Audience interaction led to several intriguing questions. One issue that plagues many a museum across the world is the dilemma 'of storage versus display'. How does one ensure access to an entire collection when only a percentage of it is ever exhibited to the public at one time. Ataya mentioned the various approaches currently in practice; from online collections to open storage and mobile exhibitions for schools and remote communities. Nevertheless, big is not necessary better and demands for quantity should never be allowed to overshadow the quality of a museum's work.

As the UAE positions itself as a cultural hub for the 21<sup>st</sup> century, Ataya is confident that the role of museums in building a 'destination' shall only grow. As these guardians convey the value of our heritage, the bonds of respect and understanding among communities and tourists alike shall strengthen.

In today's globalised world and consumerist focus, the dark hand of cynicism can easily overshadow one's opinion of museums. Saeed Saeed left the audience with a glimmer of hope; for in the USA alone, the 35,000 registered museums exceed the number of MacDonalds and Starbucks put together. Further evidence that mankind's greatest appetite is his natural curiosity to explore his past, in order to know his present and his future.


